Juneteenth

In 2021, the U.S. government officially made Juneteenth a federal holiday. However, people have been celebrating this important day, on June 19, for much longer.

“Juneteenth” is a combination of the words “June” and “nineteenth.” This was the day in 1865 when Union troops got to Galveston, Texas. They were there to tell enslaved people they were free.

In 1863, the Emancipation Proclamation declared that enslaved people in Confederate states were free. However, it took more than two years for those enslaved in Texas to be informed of this news. Even still, some enslavers refused to free the people they enslaved until forced to do so.
