Identifying Appositives

Appositives are nouns or phrases that rename the nouns, pronouns, or phrases that they are placed next to, called antecedents. They are most often used to add information to a sentence, provide clarity, or add variety to sentence structure.

Appositives are often offset by commas, em dashes, parentheses, or colons, but not always. When the appositive is essential to the meaning or clarity of a sentence, it is not offset by any punctuation.

antecedent appositive	
Examples:	I want you, my best friend, to come to the mall with me.
	The addressed you knows who they are, so the appositive is nonessential.
anteceder	The mall store <u>Pet Paradise</u> is having a sale. There are many mall stores, so the appositive is essential.
