

ow would you mark 100 years of something? The year 1889 marked 100 years since the end of the French Revolution. One way France marked the special year was by having a big World's Fair. Another was by building a tower.

Gustave Eiffel was a French engineer. He built many things with metal, like bridges and statues. He even helped build the Statue of Liberty! From 1887 to 1889, he built his most famous one of all: the Eiffel Tower.

At that time, no building in the world was 200 meters (656 feet) tall. Eiffel wanted his tower to be 300 meters (984 feet) tall! That's about 81 stories. Most people didn't think he could do it.

But he did it! It took 7,300 metric tons of metal and more than 10,100 metric tons of material in all. It also took about 2.5 million rivets to hold it all together. The Eiffel Tower was the tallest building in the world for more than 40 years—and that was without its flagpole adding another 12 meters (39 feet)!




Today, the Eiffel Tower gets about 6 million visitors a year. Sometimes it's closer to 7 million. Visitors can stop on all three floors. The first two floors have stores and places to eat. The third has a remake of Gustave Eiffel's office. All three have great views of Paris! You may want to use one of the five elevators to reach the top, though. It's a 1,710-step climb otherwise!




